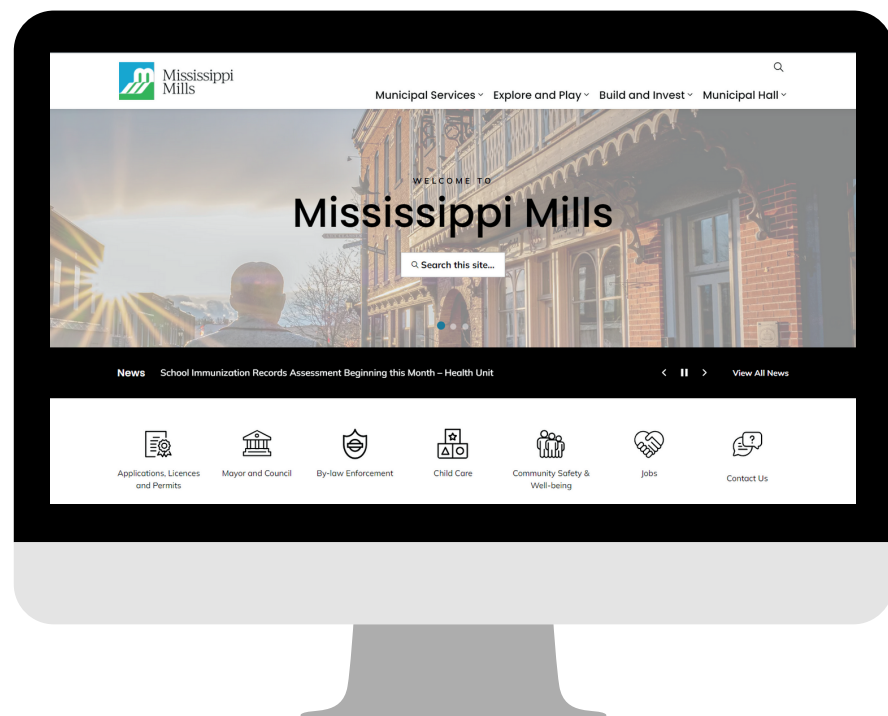

Municipal Budget in the Spotlight

Council formally adopted the capital portion of the 2025 Municipal Budget. The capital budget includes **\$12,807,589** in projects, such as:

- **\$2.7 million** for hardsurfaced renewals and microsurfacing projects
- **\$1.95 million** for the County Road 29 Watermain construction
- **\$435,000** for a new plow truck
- **\$421,000** for upgrades to parks and recreation facilities

- **\$30,000** dedicated to climate change initiatives and traffic calming measures.

The operations budget will come before the February 11 Council meeting for consideration.

Stay tuned to the council meeting in February, where options for the operating budget will be tabled.

Adopt a Hydrant or a Catch Basin

In an emergency, every second counts. You can help a firefighter save precious time by clearing the snow around any fire hydrants on or near your property. By making a one metre clearing around the hydrant, you will assist in securing water for firefighters - fire trucks carry a finite amount of water, after all.

On the warmer days, take some time to ensure the catch basins on and around your

property are clear of muck, leaves and snow. This will help prevent flooding, potentially saving you and your neighbours' basements.

This winter season, adopt a hydrant or a catch basin and be proud that you're doing yourself and your neighbours good.

Which Sidewalks Get Plowed?

In Mississippi Mills, sidewalks are categorized into classes, similar to roads.

- **Class 1:** The sidewalks that see the most use, often along major roads.
- **Class 2:** Sidewalks used less often, often in residential areas.
- **Class 3:** Sidewalks with minimal use, often deeper into residential areas.

Class 1 sidewalks are plowed within 12 hours after five centimetres of snow accumulation, whereas Class 2 sidewalks are plowed within 24 hours after eight centimetres of snow accumulation. Class 3 sidewalks are not winter maintained, and considered "closed" between November 1 and April 15.

Did you Renew your Dog Tags?

We all love our four-pawed friends, but did you know that all dogs in Mississippi Mills must be licensed? Dog tags must be re-issued each year,

with the previous year's tags expiring on December 31. If you're yet to visit the Municipal Office this year, your licence is likely expired - come pay us a visit!



Flood season is around the corner

In the lead-up and during the flood season, the Municipality monitors water levels, has regular Municipal Emergency Control Group (MECG) meetings and works closely with partners like the Mississippi Valley Conservation Authority (MVCA) to be prepared.

How well prepared are you for flooding? Here are some tips to help prepare and protect your property in the event of a flood:

- Ensure your sump pump is clear, in good working condition and has a backwater valve
- Ensure downspouts are clear and the outlet is at least three metres from the dwelling
- Remove valuable items from basements or lower floors that could be subject to flooding
- Familiarize yourself with the Municipality's **Emergency Preparedness Plan**
- Pack an emergency kit that can be accessed easily and carried quickly in case of evacuation; include any necessary medication, blankets, extra clothing, flashlights, water and non-perishable food

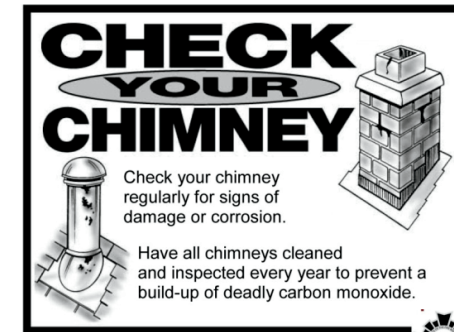
No Ice is Safe Ice!

Every winter, emergency departments across the nation receive numerous cries for help from those who have fallen through the ice. On December 28, 2024, in the County of Frontenac, OPP responded to two separate incidents where recreational vehicles plunged to the bottom of the lake due to thin ice: In Ottawa, the fire department responded to four calls of pets falling through ice in the final week of December.

The message is simple: no ice is safe ice! Always be suspicious - appearance cannot measure the strength of the ice. Never venture out onto ice alone, and always inform someone of your plan including where you're going and when you'll be back.

If you hear the ice cracking beneath you, do the following:

- Lay flat on the ice.
- Yell for help loudly and clearly.
- Crawl or roll back to land.

How Often do you Clean your Chimney?

There's nothing quite like getting snugly and warm in front of a wood stove or fireplace. Behind the scenes, do you know the condition of your chimney - one of the most important components of the fireplace that keeps your home free of smoke and carbon monoxide?

Chimneys should be cleaned and inspected yearly to prevent deadly buildup of carbon monoxide. Carbon monoxide is produced when fuels such as wood, heating oil, propane, gasoline or natural gas does not burn completely. Blockages in your chimney or vents can lead to a buildup of carbon monoxide, not to mention the possibility of an explosive chimney fire.

Large chimney fires, with their immense flames or dense smoke that shoots out the top, may be noticed by neighbours or those passing-by. Slower burning chimney fires may not be as dramatic, but they still

cause just as much damage. As the slow burning builds up heat in the chimney, the structure of the chimney may be damaged and require repairs. Prevent chimney fires and carbon monoxide buildup by taking good care of your chimney; cozy up to your fireplace with peace of mind.

For added peace of mind, make sure your home meets the requirements for carbon monoxide alarm placements. If your home has an attached garage or a fuel-burning appliance, install a carbon monoxide alarm outside each sleeping area.

Carbon monoxide is invisible, tasteless, and odourless. If you have flu-like symptoms without a fever, it may be carbon monoxide poisoning.
